

### A Sewing Room Chat with the President

#### "QUILTY AS CHARGED"

The other day, just for grins, I made a list of equipment the average person would need to start quilting. Realistically that list should include only: a sewing machine; rotary cutter; cutting mat; at least one versatile ruler; an iron; a heat-safe ironing surface; fabric; thread; and a pattern. This is a simple and elegant list, and I expect most of you would agree that the *average* person could embark on a quilting journey with these implements. It does not explain, however, why my list filled two 8 1/2 by 11 inch, college ruled pages, and I wasn't nearly finished with what I consider "quilting necessities", or why I can't maneuver easily in my sewing room because it is full of quilting "stuff". How does a seemingly straightforward hobby like quilting lead to sewing spaces stuffed to the gills with fabric, patterns, books, tools, thread, gadgets, embellishments, ad infinitum, that the quilter believes she cannot do without?

Perhaps there is a clue in the "stuff" of this **year's Stash-4-Cash – which, by the way, was the most successful Stash-4-Cash to date. The final total came to \$1,819.55, of which \$860.00 went to our Youth Auxiliary, "SEW Cool"!!!!!!** Awesome job and a High-Five to our Activities committee and everyone else who helped put the event together. Well done!!

But I digress. What was noticeable this year, as in years past, was the intoxicating effect of quilting "stuff" as evidenced by the keen "quilterly" interest and "quilterly" fierce bidding competition over the donated items. The prospect of obtaining more quilting "stuff" can emotionally overwhelm a quilter, and in some cases can be incapacitating. Quilters must, at the very least, investigate everything and anything "quilty".

It is no accident that Show and Tell is, unanimously and unquestionably, the most popular segment of Guild meetings. Quilters can't resist seeing what other quilters have been up to. A quilter can be content indefinitely in a well-stocked sewing room, and can't resist touring other quilters' sewing rooms. A quilter never turns down an opportunity to go to a quilt shop unless she is deathly ill, and may still go even then! Events such as the upcoming **Shop Hop (April 21 to May 7)** serve only to make "quilting fever" worse. There are even events that concentrate the quilting experience, such as the **Guild Retreat at West Piney (September 28 through October 2, 2016)** or **HQMS (May 5 – 7, 2016 at the South Town Expo**

**Center in Salt Lake; check [www.hqms.org](http://www.hqms.org) for details),** and after being saturated with everything "quilty" for one or more days in a row, it is usually necessary for quilters to spend several days recuperating.

The results of the "Quilting Bug" are evident all around us, but what is at the bottom of all of the accumulation and

obsession? Seriously, all of the hoarding does not necessarily occur without any rhyme or reason. Let's take fabric, for instance. Some of you may have learned from the media that a joint task force comprised of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the Department of Commerce (DOC) recently uncovered a scheme perpetrated by fabric manufacturers to induce unsuspecting shoppers in to purchasing larger quantities of fabric than intended. Back in the 1990's when quilting was soaring in popularity, fabric manufacturers began including a chemical, one that acts upon the part of the brain responsible for impulse control, in the finishing compound of their fabric. Chemical vapors (mostly odorless) from bolts of new fabric, concentrated in quilt shops and fabric stores carrying multiple bolts, were inhaled by unsuspecting shoppers, resulting not only in a record increase in sales, but also continued volume sales as the chemical triggered addiction-like fabric purchasing behavior. The FDA suspected that fabric manufacturers were including the extra chemical in their finishing compounds, but before the FDA and DOC could establish a solid case and crack down on this practice, manufacturers changed their tactics.

With the advent of affordable technology, fabric manufacturers abandoned the chemical approach, and began embedding a microchip in each cardboard bolt core. These chips were designed to transmit subliminal messages at a frequency at the extreme upper edge of the average person's hearing register. At such a high frequency one does not consciously hear anything other than perhaps ringing in one's ears, but the messages are received and comprehended by the brain nevertheless. The actual verbiage of the messages has not yet been deciphered though reports from individuals participating in the task force's double-blind test include: experiencing an urgency to purchase additional yardage after a sudden thought that the manufacturer was no longer producing that particular fabric; experiencing a feeling of well-being when spending all cash on hand or maxing out one or more credit cards when purchasing fabric; experiencing an overwhelming sense that life would not be complete without owning significant yardage of several fabric lines. How many times have you or someone you know said, jokingly, "That fabric *spoke to me*, and I just had to buy it!" Who knew it was really happening?!

If you are concerned about the effect the chips may have on your budget, your available storage space, or your marriage, be assured that help will soon be available. The task force has employed a group of specialists, including engineers and psychologists, to assist in neutralizing the problem and providing rehabilitative and preventive treatment to those chronically or acutely affected. They are currently working on two very promising possibilities. First, though going forward the addition of microchips to cardboard bolt cores is banned, there are still millions

and millions of bolts of fabric in the retail market. As it would be impractical, inconvenient, and probably impossible to retrieve and destroy every chip-containing bolt core, a tiny ear bud, akin to an RFID blocking device, is on the drawing board. This device will block transmissions from the chips, and allow the wearer to purchase fabric more sensibly. The ear bud insert is form-fitting and virtually undetectable, like some hearing aids. For maximum effectiveness the buds will need to be worn in both ears whenever the wearer is within 100 feet of any establishment carrying the old bolts, and certainly while the wearer is inside any such establishments. These devices may or may not be available in time for shop hop, but we will forward availability information as soon as it is received.

The other promising treatment, (this will be strongly recommended for anyone for whom the ear buds are not effective, or for anyone who has experienced addiction-like fabric purchasing behavior), is similar to the multi-step, support group concept. It is expected that a specific format for the proposed groups will be ready soon, and we will forward information on availability and locations of local groups as soon as it is released.

At this point I expect that you are thoroughly disgusted with fabric manufacturers, and if you believe all of this about mind-altering chemical additives in fabric finishing compounds and subliminal message emitting microchips embedded in cardboard bolt cores I have a really nice *bridge* I'd like to sell you; I have accomplished my goal; APRIL FOOL! Forgive me but I couldn't resist! Wasn't it comforting, though, even for a little while, to think that there was some rational basis for the hoarding of fabric? No one really knows why quilting is so consuming, and for that matter does anyone really want to know? We enjoy quilting, and it isn't necessary to know why.

**So take part in Shop Hop, support participating quilt stores, buy lots and lots of gorgeous fabric, and have a wonderful adventure with your quilting friends. That's what it's all about.**

Until we meet again I remain "Quilty as Charged". Keep singing, my friends!

Karen also passed around a "what's your talent" sheet. She requested that you write down 3 things that you like to do. She wants people to work at things that they enjoy.





## WHY DO QUILTS COST SO MUCH? COSTS FOR MATERIALS, CONSTRUCTION, & FINISHING FOR A 65" SQUARE QUILT\*

### MATERIALS

Fabric for Top  
6 yards @ \$10.00 = \$60

Fabric Backing  
4.5 yards @ \$10 = \$45

Fabric for Binding  
5/8 yard @ \$10 = \$6.25

Batting  
2 yards @ \$10 = \$22

Total Cost of Materials = \$133.25

### CONSTRUCTION

(labor estimated at \$10.00 per hour)

#### Making the Top

(includes preparing the fabric, cutting the pieces, sewing the blocks, setting into rows, adding borders)

50 hours x \$10.00 = \$500.00

Assembling Quilt Sandwich


